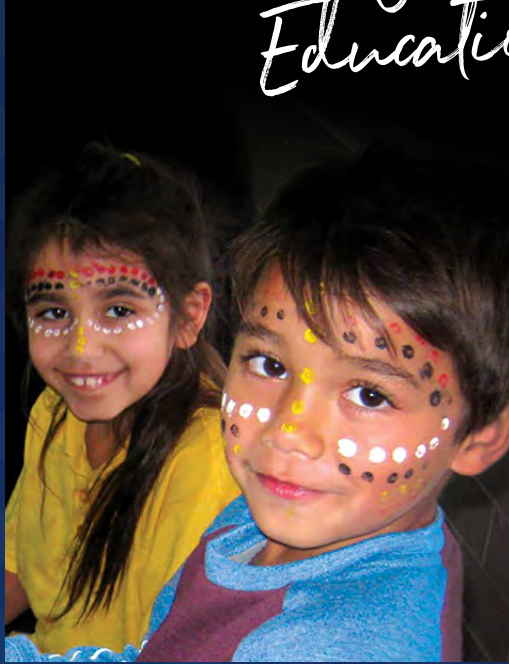

Financial security IN RURAL ZAMBIA

Wakume, is a woman over 70 years old who is taking care of grand children in Limulunga royal village. Life has been hard for her as a single-female head of household. With the support of Edmund Rice Foundation Australia, Wakume was one of the community members who received practical education in livestock, crop production and entrepreneurship. Since that training, Wakume's wellbeing has taken a significant positive turnaround. Her stock of chickens has increased by more than 50% and she has a much improved income to pay for necessities. She is able to save some of her income from her poultry enterprise through the Community Savings Group and she feels confident that, if there's a financial emergency, she will be prepared and able to deal with it.



Spicy vinegar IN THE PHILIPPINES

A group of women in Maasin are taking some inspiring action whilst waiting to have their newly established association's "sustainable livelihood program" funded by the Philippines government. It's been a hard road over the last two years, participating in Edmund Rice trainings and meeting government requirements for funding. Now that it's done, and whilst waiting for news, the group has used what they've learnt – together with some entrepreneurial flair – and started a small scale business making and selling "Sukhang" (a spicy Filipino vinegar). The vinegar, chilli and other spices used are all native and homegrown and, from a start-up capital of only A\$40, the group's "sukhang" is slowly becoming known as one of Maasin's prides. They were a sold-out hit during the City Agricultural and Trade fare and orders are coming from locals, restaurants and stores. The Association is still hoping to receive government funding but, for now, members making the "sukhang" are looking to increase production.





A living story of change IN BOLIVIA

Life has not been easy for Josué and his brothers and sisters. His father died when he was 7 and he struggled at secondary school. Josué received support and tutoring from the Christian Brothers' Centre (Centro Hermano Manolo) in the chaotic La Cancha marketplace in Bolivia.

After six years attendance, he finished school and joined the Police Academy. In December 2019, Josue graduated as a police officer. He invited his mother and the Centre's director to be present as his caregivers. Josué considers the Christian Brothers and the Centre staff as his family. In a very touching moment, as Josué mentioned during his graduation that if it weren't for the Centre he would not have made it, we witnessed a living story of change.



Pro-active presence, compassion and liberation HUON VALLEY, TASMANIA

Because of the strong Eddie Rice presence and relationships created over many years in the Huon Valley of Tasmania, a compassionate response to the bushfire devastated community throughout 2019 year was possible. Edmund Rice Camps Tas held specially designed afternoon programs for young people directly affected by the traumatic fires. Children had fun and created friendships while their families dealt with damages and loss. ERCTas also partnered with a Catholic girls' school in Hobart to facilitate their year 10 school camp to the bushfire affected area. The girls stayed at the previously used evacuation centre in the rural township of Huonville. From there, with supervision from ERCTas, they provided support to students in primary schools, assisted in the Huon Eldercare Nursing home and worked with local council in replanting trees. The Eddie Rice response to community needs with genuine pro-active presence, compassion and liberation was a highlight of the year.

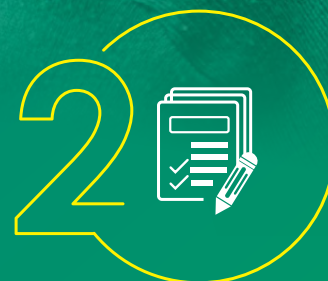
How does it work?
