






Our vision is for access to quality education and lifelong learning opportunities for all, supporting empowered communities that determine their own futures.

I'm delighted to provide you with my report for 2019. I hope our supporters and members look with pride on the inspiring stories and promising growth throughout the pages of this report. The work of Edmund Rice Foundation is a true collective effort and I am so proud of our achievements as a global community.


I'm proud to report that again our revenue grew, to just shy of \$4 million. This is a huge reward for hard work by our fundraising team, who have continued to share the stories of our programs and beneficiaries to inspire those in our network to give. The amount of program requests for funding support also continues to grow and this year we set ourselves some very lofty goals in terms of program funding, attempting to provide more funding than ever before in the history of this organisation.

In 2019, Edmund Rice Foundation worked in 11 countries funding and delivering over \$3.3 million to 35 programs. We are so very proud to work with such inspiring, selfless humans, who are attempting to change the lives of many through education every day. We are constantly humbled to see the stories of change and empowerment. This year we know that over 70,000 people directly received support to change their lives for the better and we know that their families and their communities will also benefit, so the number of impacted people through our work is in the millions each year. For an organisation our size, we couldn't be prouder of that fact. It motivates our team and it drives us to be as efficient and serve as many people as we can.

Our focus this year was to do more in terms of program funding. Our Nairobi office continues to grow from strength to strength and its impact is starting to be seen by our teams in Africa – providing a platform for our communities to work towards future sustainability. My sincerest thanks to the entire Graham family for their belief in this and their generosity and unwavering support of this project.

I would also like to acknowledge the unbelievable efforts of the 500 Supporters' Group and their incredible fundraising achievements for the Ruben Centre. # 2019 Activity Report

# **Gone Fishing Immersion**

ERFA's Gone Fishing Immersion to East Africa took place in February. ERFA and Ruben Centre were delighted to have Kurt Fearnley join the immersion and, together with the Australian High Commissioner, H.E. Ms Alison Chartres, formally open the Kurt Fearnley Special Needs Unit.

## **Brisbane Golf Day**

ERFA's 2nd annual golf day was held in May at St Lucia Golf Links. Once again, it was a very enjoyable day on and off the course. Almost 100 participants joined to raise funds to Liberate Lives through Education initiatives delivered by ERFA partner programs.





# 500 Supporters' Group Luncheons – Melbourne

In its 19th year, the 500 Supporter Group held annual lunches at the MCG in May and October raising more than \$750,000 to support the work of ERFA partner program, Ruben Centre in Nairobi's Mukuru slum. 2019 speakers included Ruben ambassador and paralympian Kurt Fearnley, Ruben's Liz Mwangi and Frank O'Shea, AFL father & son Barry and Tom Mitchell, racing legends Lindsey Smith and Greg Miles and MC, Leon Wiegard.

### **Timor Immersion**

In July, ERFA took a group of seven EREA staff, parents, alumni and supporters to Timor Leste to visit our partner programs. For most, it was the first opportunity to meet amazing people, understand in greater detail the work taking place on the ground and explore the option of possible immersions in the future.

# **Gone Trekking Immersion**

For the first time, ERFA ran an immersion to PNG in August to raise funds and awareness for the work of Callan Services. Ten individuals from Australia and PNG took on the challenge of walking the Kokoda Track over 10 days. Peer-to-peer fundraising reached the goal of \$50,000 and it was great for the group to see exactly what these funds were used for.









### Liberate Lives AFL Luncheon - Perth

Perth rallied behind the 2nd annual Liberate Lives AFL Luncheon in August at the Pan Pacific Hotel with over 200 guests raising funds for ERFA partner programs. Speakers included Channel 10 TV Sports Journalist Tim Gossage, Multiple Gold Medal winning Paralympian and Ruben ambassador Kurt Fearnley, AFL Umpire Head Coach Hayden Kennedy, AFL Legends Ron Alexander and Peter Mann and Channel 7 TV News Presenter Rick Ardon.

## Mary Rice Luncheon - Melbourne

For the 6th year running, the Mary Rice Luncheon took place in Parkville in September. More than 140 committed women came together to learn, share and raise funds to support the education of the Mary Rice Centre children and their families. Over the past 5 years, these events have had more than 500 women participating. Keynote speakers and panel consisted of MC Kathleen Saundry, Anne Doyle, Helen Blaskett, Julie Donohoe, Jen Tobin and Eliza Duffy.

## **Workplace Giving Program**

Through the support of Paywise Salary Packaging, ERFA's first formal workplace giving program was launched by the Ascot Group in Melbourne. Employees are able to make donation amount of their choice each pay cycle and give their ongoing tax-free gift to support liberating education.

# **DFAT Friendship Grant**

In 2019, ERFA was one of 46 Australian community organisations to receive an Australian Aid: Friendship Grant awarded by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. We partnered with Mary MacKillop Today in a teacher and parent training project in Railaco, Timor Leste.

## Sequins & Sandshoes – Brisbane

Sequins and Sandshoes was held to support and connect more people with ERFA's Best Foot Forward campaign in October. The afternoon/evening session was hosted by The Montague Hotel in Brisbane and a great time was had by all, listening to live music with great food and refreshments in hand. In total, the event raised \$20,000 for ERFA–supported women's empowerment programs.

# Best Foot Forward – national day of giving

In October, Best Foot Forward, in its inaugural year, helped raise awareness and funds for ERFA programs focussed on empowering women and girls through education. More than 2,500 "Best Friends Forever (BFFs)", including students from Edmund Rice schools, supported the campaign through wearing pink shoelaces and sharing on social media. In 24 hours, we exceeded our goal and raised \$275,000. These funds have enabled the education of 550 women and girls around the world.

This awakens us to our responsibilities and compels us to respond sensitively to the hopes and needs of local communities supporting them to eradicate poverty and suffering.





# Aliving story of change IN BOLIVIA

Life has not been easy for Josué and his brothers and sisters. His father died when he was 7 and he struggled at secondary school. Josué received support and tutoring from the Christian Brothers' Centre (Centro Hermano Manolo) in the chaotic La Cancha marketplace in Bolivia.

After six years attendance, he finished school and joined the Police Academy. In December 2019, Josué graduated as a police officer. He invited his mother and the Centre's director to be present as his caregivers. Josué considers the Christian Brothers and the Centre staff as his family. In a very touching moment, as Josué mentioned during his graduation that if it weren't for the Centre he would not have made it, we witnessed a living story of change.







### **Summary Financial Report**

The summary financial report does not contain all the disclosures required by Australian Accounting Standards applied in preparation of the audited financial report of Edmund Rice Foundation (Australia). Reading the summary financial report, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial report of Edmund Rice Foundation (Australia) and the auditor's report thereon.

#### The Audited Financial Report and Our Report Thereon

We expressed a qualified audit opinion on the audited financial report in our report dated 31 December 2019. The basis for our qualified opinion was in relation to the completeness of donations. Donations are a significant source of fundraising revenue for Edmund Rice Foundation (Australia). The Edmund Rice Foundation (Australia) has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of donations prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding fundraising revenue from this source was limited, our audit procedures with respect to donations had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion on whether the recorded donations of Edmund Rice Foundation (Australia) are complete.

#### Responsibilities of Responsible Entities' for the Summary Financial Report

The responsible entities are responsible for the preparation of the summary financial report on the basis described in Note 1 to the audited financial report, to the extent applicable to the summary financial report.
