In 2017, when she was 14 years old, she founded the ERCWA Multicultural AFL Umpiring Academy – the first of its kind in WA, and perhaps Australia.


Bringing cultural diversity into AFL
Umpiring has been a long term objective
of the AFL and Brenda is smashing
barriers by introducing umpiring to
multicultural young people. Her umpires
have broken cultural stereotypes,
inspired mainstream Australians
with their professionalism and skill
and brought a strong sense of cultural
harmony to the community.

Brenda was born in Uganda before migrating to Australia with her family in 2007. Shortly after her arrival, she joined the Butler Falcons; a multicultural all-girls AFL team run by ER Camps WA.

Brenda found her passion for Australia's game through this program and was inspired to give back by empowering other young people through her Umpiring Academy.

Now in its fourth year of operation, the Academy has developed over 60 umpires. Several have entered the talent pathway, umpiring in their respective districts and earning an income.

Brenda is considered a role model by her peers and, for her efforts, won the title of WA Young Person of the Year in 2019.





# OF, FOR AND BY The Children

Children in India face threats to their standards of living, health, education and justice. PRATYeK's formal Children's Parliaments provide children a voice to keep duty bearers accountable to the delivery and realization of child rights with a particular emphasis on the last (marginalized) child.

120 'YASH Kids' who belong to marginalized communities are provided tuition to support their school curriculum, Creative English speaking & math classes, computer classes & midday meals after school. They participate in the 'YASH Children's Parliament (YCP)' where young leaders come together to discuss issues they face in daily life and to find solutions themselves.

With the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic lockdown, the project was able to move to an online teaching system and courses on COVID-19, Global Goal Keepers & Earth Pro-Activist were delivered.

#### Due to the generosity of ERFA donors:

all students passed their courses with flying colors;

one student was awarded 3rd prize

from hundreds of participants in a World Environment Day poster competition;

YASH kids created a page on social media to spread awareness about the Convention on the Rights of the Child, human rights and earth rights; families in need were provided rations; and YASH Kids raised funds by selling homemade masks.

Jessica Dewhurst is a human rights defender, Queens Young Leader and ERI UN Youth Ambassador from South Africa. She is the Founder and CEO of the award winning human rights organisation The Justice Desk (ERFA partner program), which focuses on educating, advocating and equipping youth, government, civil society and vulnerable groups across South Central Africa in human rights. Jessica has worked across the globe in the fight for fundamental human rights and has received countless awards for her work.

Most recently she received a medal from Queen Elizabeth II at Buckingham Palace, and was named Glamour's Woman of the Year in Activism. Her organisation is a partner of the Nobel Peace Prize Summit, and The Queens Commonwealth Trust. Jessica is a passionate and proud South African, who believes in the power of everyday activists, especially among the youth.



### Can you tell us about your background?

I began as a young South African, hearing of the magnificent "rainbow nation" that was not truly reflected in the lives of everyday South Africans. I dedicated my life to the fight for fundamental human rights, challenging systemic injustice, and using my privilege in order to create platforms for the voices of ALL people to be heard and respected.

Since starting The Justice Desk in 2013, it has gone on to grow into an incredible team of change-makers across the globe, who have changed the lives of over 800,000 people!

### How did you become involved in the Edmund Rice network?

I began my Edmund Rice journey in 2003 when I attended Christian Brothers College, St John's, as a student, in Cape Town, South Africa. I was mentored by an incredible Christian Brother called Br Paul Hurley. He took a chance on me, and was the catalyst for me choosing to use my life for good. I went on to start The Justice Desk within the charism of Blessed Edmund Rice, which is one of equality, justice and human rights.

### What inspires you most in your work?

Working in communities and meeting the real heroes working hard, each and every day, to make their communities safer and more just places. These are the people that inspire me! Mothers, fathers, teachers, community leaders, youth – everyone playing their part to build the country they deserve. Spending time with them, learning from them, and loving them, is the greatest blessing I could ever ask for. It's a privilege to serve alongside my fellow South Africans, and it is something I don't take for granted.

## What difference has the Edmund Rice program made to your life?

Working at The Justice Desk has shaped me into a fierce and determined activist, with a deep love and passion for people. No matter the amount of negative things I see in our communities or on the news – they don't matter. Because I have also seen the incredible acts of kindness, generosity, compassion and love that are in our communities – which have resulted in my unyielding belief in the inherent goodness that is within us all.







# Teachery Training Teachery IN NEW KENYAN EARLY

# CHILDHOOD CURRICULUM

Clever use of donor funding has seen **Edmund Rice Catholic Education Centre** (ERCEC) in Embulbul roll out an initiative to ensure its teachers are compliant with the new Kenyan Ministry of Education Early Childhood Development Education (ECDE) curriculum. The school invested some of its teacher training budget to formally train two ECDE teachers who then went on to train other teachers at the school in a "train the trainer" style system.

Once preschool teachers were trained they worked with the Year 1 teachers

to handover the methodologies and syllabus for the graduating class cohort. The Year 1 teachers then trained and mentored the Year 2 teachers.

This approach meant that resources for teacher development were not all spent on the one identified area. It also ensured close cooperation between the primary teachers, strengthened team teaching and it provided role modelling for the children and rest of the staff.

Ten primary teachers have now been trained under this approach



A recent survey in Timor-Leste showed that at the end of grade one, 70% of children could not read a single word. Given that 71% of primary school teachers only have a high school education, and many have no formal qualifications, this outcome isn't so surprising.

ERFA's implementing partner, Mary Mackillop Today, provides training for teachers in teaching methodology, creative classroom set-up, and child development. This empowers teachers to provide quality education in the classroom for their students.

Project Coordinator Ivone Ximenes explains: "For example,

we provide teachers with feedback from our observations, and actively demonstrate reading books to students. We also focus on strengthening the correct way to pronounce words".

Follow up monitoring has shown teachers are implementing the new skills and using MMT national curriuculm-aligned Tetun literacy resources. Through increasing teacher skills and knowledge, hundreds of children are now receiving quality education in safe and inclusive classroom environments, giving them the best possible start to their education



### JOHN MCKENNA

When did you first become involved with the Edmund Rice network? (what inspired you to do that?)

It was some 53 years ago and I am still inspired by the wonderful work of the Christian Brothers to help the less fortunate of our society both here and overseas. In all those years, I have witnessed their work expand from schools and orphanages to all kinds of caring ministries, both here and overseas.

### What have you seen/learnt through your involvement that you would like to share with others?

Though we have our challenges at home, we Australians do indeed live in 'the Lucky Country' and by being involved in the Edmund Rice network I have realized how generous Australians can be, not only with their financial support but also with the use of their time and skills.

### What inspires you most about the work undertaken by Edmund Rice Foundation?

It is outward looking. It is there to support those who can't support themselves. It is well organized, accountable and does make a difference.

#### What impact has supporting the work made to your life?

I've had the privilege of meeting and working with people who have the best of motives. I've been inspired by the examples of people working both here and especially overseas who are making an extraordinary difference to our troubled world usually without much recognition and against tough opposition. They keep on going so I feel it is essential they be supported in their work.

### What would you say to people thinking about how best to support Edmund Rice Foundation?

Get involved. We all have different stresses in our lives and calls on our time, skills or finances but any involvement no matter how small will make a difference. And though it's not the reason to become involved, the personal rewards I've mentioned already are wonderful
