

Accreditation Success:

AUSTRALIAN NGO COOPERATION PROGRAM (ANCP)





ERFA is delighted to announce that our organisation has received base level accreditation with the Australian Government's Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Following a rigorous accreditation process that assessed our organisational structure, philosophies, policies and practices, we have joined around 60 other Australian NGOs to receive funding under the **ANCP**.

The ANCP is a unique Australian development program. It is a partnership between the Australian Government and highly effective Australian Non-Government Organisations (NGOs). For over 45 years, this partnership has supported the most disadvantaged in communities around the world. You can read more here.

In 2022/23, three (3) ERFA partner projects will receive funding under the ANCP:

- The Mbokodo Club Project Empowering Girl Survivors of GBV in South Africa implemented by The Justice Desk
- Ntsika yeThemba (Pillars of Hope) Young Males Ending GBV in South Africa implemented by The Justice Desk
- Women's Empowerment and SILC (Savings and Internal Lendings Community) project in Kenya implemented by Mirror of Hope


HELPING NEWLY ARRIVED

Refugees Find Their Voice IN AUSTRALIA

Newly arrived refugees in Australia, especially from war-torn countries like Afghanistan, often find integration into Australian society a challenge. One of the greatest difficulties is finding meaningful employment.

In response, the Edmund Rice Centre NSW has conducted a series of orientation programs in Western Sydney, to assist new arrivals understand the norms of mainstream Australia and have their questions answered by former refugees. Farid Ghalib, Coordinator of Refugee Programs and a refugee himself says, "Often people struggle to understand the cultural nuances that Australians take for granted, which can make communicating with mainstream Australians, let alone prospective employers, a very difficult exercise".

ERFA supports the Edmund Rice Centre's Settlement Cities program which assists newly arrived refugees by enhancing confidence and providing skills and knowledge to help find employment.

Interview with SAMMY MUGA

Sammy Muga works in ERFA's Nairobi branch office and has been seconded to work as the Team Leader at Edmund Rice Centre Nairobi which is a merger of Mary Rice Centre, Edmund Rice Advocacy Network and Edmund Rice Karibu Group. The merger increases efficiency and effectiveness of Edmund Rice work in Nairobi. Sammy is responsible for leading the ERCN team, managing key stakeholder relationships and ensuring that the partnership with the Kibera community is empowering, collaborative and equitable. Sammy studied Community Development, Social Work & Welfare and Social Development and continues to love learning. He is currently pursuing BA in Strategic Development studies, planning and leadership Management.

How did you become involved in the Edmund Rice network?

I grew up in the slums of Kibera (one of the world's largest slums) and became involved with the Edmund Rice Karibu Group where I worked as a volunteer from 2008 to 2015 before being appointed Executive Officer is 2016. In 2013, I started supporting ERFA as an immersion leader coordinating visits for ERFA's Australian supporters.

What inspires you most in your work?

I am a person of incredible resilience with huge compassion and a deep sense of community service. I spend my spare time visiting orphanages within the slums of Nairobi, caring for children, helping them to feel worthy and appreciated and putting a smile on their faces. I also visit people in prisons, encouraging them to care for their inmates, to have fun and to study using donated books and pens. In my work at ERCN, I am passionate about fostering effectiveness, efficiency and impact; engaging with the Kibera community and other stakeholders to raise the consciousness about disability inclusiveness and to improve access to services for Children with Disabilities; and supporting households of Children with Disabilities through education.



HIT NOEL O'BRIEN

Noel O'Brien was an extraordinary supporter of ERFA from its inception in 1986. He was the founder of the 500 Supporters luncheons at the MCG.



Over 20 years ago, Noel began what grew into a most effective fundraising event with the twice annual luncheons, specifically for Christian Brothers' development projects in Africa. Over the years, many millions of dollars have been raised, which in more recent years have been devoted to the Ruben Centre, enabling the incredible work to continue.

Noel grew up in Essendon during the Great Depression. The Christian Brothers educated him without charge, for which Noel was forever grateful. While at school, he began selling peanuts at Saturday afternoon VFL matches, expanding his operation to many venues in Melbourne and later his enterprises nationally.

Through persistent hard work and effective networking, he became a successful businessman, specialising in hospitality.

Noel brought many with him with his charisma, intelligence and wisdom. Many a needy schoolboy earned some money at football matches working for Noel on Saturday afternoons. Noel was devoted to his wife, Carmel, and his 7 children. He was very generous and a great supporter of many good causes.

It was only at his funeral that the extent of his benefaction was understood. His support, given to so many of ERFA's works in Africa, was continuous and most memorable.

Noel visited projects in Tanzania and Kenya to see first-hand the issues and needs of people. Understanding that ongoing success of the many projects then being conducted by the Brothers would require more expertise, he enabled staff to receive further training. With his vision, Noel made a difference to a great number of lives. Never did he put himself at the centre of any donation, but rather the cause being advanced.

He was truly humble. We are very grateful and will long remember this great man.

ERFA Vigity SYDNEY SCHOOLS

Schools in Sydney were delighted to hear from Edmund Rice legend Br Frank O'Shea in November. Br Frank shared his journey living out the values of presence, compassion, and liberation, including 38 years of service to the developing world.



Br Frank was accompanied by Jason Bongers, with the shared goal of encouraging students to engage in a global fight against injustice and poverty. Br Frank's 28 years in Africa – culminating in 10 years as the Director of the Ruben Centre Nairobi – provided much food for thought during the colourful presentations.

REDUCING GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE Through behavioural change

In rural Zambia, girl children often become pregnant, are subsequently forced into marriage and most likely drop out of school. This can happen as early as 13 years of age and marriage is also sometimes seen as a strategy to "beat poverty" by the parents. However, the girls are too young to run a home. They have no prior experience emotionally and physiologically to handle marriage and care for children. The husband is likely unemployed and struggling with alcohol. The Western Cluster Program in Zambia supports strategic and repetitive GBV sensitisation campaigns among communities in Luampa, Limulung and Senanga. They have partnered with local specialists from Government departments, traditional leaders, project committees and volunteers to achieve scale, scope and impact in promoting the rights of children. Reflective dialogue meetings enable a common understanding of the contextual drivers of teenage pregnancy and GBV.

The Program ensures that women and men, boys and girls are represented to examine, validate or dispel perspectives. Subject matter specialists also share legal and policy provisions for protection from GBV with the participants.

One of the mothers reported: "I could not manage to take care of my large family as a single mother. I have eight children. I had to let one of my children get married (she was below the permitted age of marriage). After learning about the legal provisions that protect children from being married off at her age, after the workshop I immediately decided to go and retrieve my daughter from that marriage."

The involvement of girls and boys, women and men in generative dialogue has promoted a sense of collective responsibility amongst stakeholders. Traditional leaders who are said to contribute to teenage pregnancy through a "curriculum" that potentiates early sexual debut, are being openly challenged to make adjustments to their content.

Elizabeth, a traditional initiator whose job is to prepare girls for marriage, said

"GBV is happening in marriages. I will be teaching girls to report GBV to victim support and the hospital. I will teach traditional initiators to teach girls to be reporting abuses in marriages.".

Targeted communities are now aware of the laws and policies that provide protection, the reporting channels and where to get survivor support services, including free counselling services ■
