PROJECT EVALUATION

This year marked a significant period of growth and consolidation in our commitment to evidence-based programming and strategic learning. Guided by our Programming Strategy 2024-2026, we continued to align our evaluation and learning practices with our overarching goal: partnering with communities and likeminded organisations to support access to education, sustainable livelihoods, economic empowerment, and inclusive advocacy.

Evaluation and learning are key to our programming approach. In 2024, we strengthened our focus on development practice across all projects, supporting partners to deepen their capabilities in project design, monitoring, evaluation & learning (MEL), safeguarding and financial & risk management. We also addressed thematic issues including climate change, gender equality and disability equity. Our strategy emphasises continuous improvement, mutual accountability and collaboration – and this year, feedback from our partners affirmed that our approachis effectively supporting these goals.

Through tailored capacity-building plans, mentoring and targeted training, we supported partners to continue embedding systems of learning and reflection that deliver sustainable change. We also prioritised relevance and responsiveness, ensuring our tools and expectations match the realities and needs of our partners.

We continue to place strong emphasis on measuring and documenting impact, facilitating partner-led learning, and ensuring data informs decision-making.

Key achievements include:

- Conducting four online training sessions
- Launching a revised monitoring system with biannual online partner check-ins
- Facilitating a Development in Practice forum for Edmund Rice Foundation international partners to exchange programming successes and challenges
- Delivering in-person capacity building sessions focused on enhancing MEL practices and applying implementation plans
- Coordinating shared learning opportunities between partners in Kenya and the Philippines on sustainable livelihood programming
- Collaborating with financial teams to strengthen capacity
- Designing an internal monitoring system to track organisational progress against the 3-year programming strategy

Looking forward, we will continue to refine our approach to measuring impact and sharing what we learn across our network and beyond.


Through the support of Edmund Rice Ministries
Foundation Philippines Inc. (ERMFPI), in partnership with
the Australian Government through the Australian NGO
Cooperation Program (ANCP), Amalia has found a lifeline
in the Cebu Families Education for Enhanced Livelihoods
(FEEL) project. She learned business, financial and
entrepreneurial skills and gained access to seed funding.

Amalia now has financial stability and can afford not only daily necessities to provides for her family but savings for emergencies and healthcare.

Her enterprise thrives by prioritising essential goods like food and hygiene products, attracting consistent customers and generating significant profits. This success allowed Amalia to expand her store and has brought her empowerment and self-reliance.




Guiding Change: How one community project is reshaping lives

In the informal settlement of Langas, Eldoret, the challenges facing young people are complex - crime, marginalisation, exclusion, human rights violations and abuse are a part of daily life. As the head of the Guidance and Counselling at nearby Wareng High School, Lany* was overwhelmed by issues of substance abuse, absenteeism, teen pregnancy and ill-discipline.

Through a partnership with Edmund Rice Eldoret Empowerment Program (EREEP) that's changing. Students gained access to life skills and human rights training, helping them to reimagine their futures and grow both academically and personally. Lany also learned new ways to connect and counsel students, building better connections.


Transforming young lives in Kibera

Raised in the heart of Kibera, one of Kenya's largest urban slums, Bria* faced overwhelming challenges. Despite the odds, she completed her primary education but an unplanned pregnancy as a teen forced her to put her dreams on hold.

Through Mirror of Hope's Future Poa (Cool Future) project, Bria found strength in a supportive environment. She gained practical skills in tailoring, received counselling support and learned about self-care, entrepreneurship and life-skills to rebuild her confidence and independence.

Bria is now working towards opening her own fashion parlour to support her family and inspire others in the community. This will encourage other young mothers to embrace change and believe in their potential.

Set against the quiet beauty of the bush, the 2024 LEAD Program brought together 20 young people and a team of youth mentors for a weekend of challenge, growth, and transformation.

What began as a camping trip became a life-changing journey. Through team challenges, shared meals, and moments of reflection, strangers became a family — connected by courage, laughter, and deep respect.

The Candle Sharing Ceremony shone a light on the unique strengths that mentors saw in each young person. And when the youth turned the light back — honouring their mentors with heartfelt words — everyone saw it: leadership lives in empathy, in gratitude, in being seen.

By the weekend's end, one participant asked, "How do I become a mentor?"

LEAD didn't just teach leadership. It inspired it.

In 2024, we proudly launched a new partnership with EREA Flexible Schools to honor Greg Hildebrand and bring his legacy to life.



Laurie's lasting gift

A life of service, a bequest of hope

Laurie Larmar will forever be remembered for his generosity, humility and lifelong commitment to community service. A successful publican, Laurie's life was defined by what he gave back.

His journey of service began at St Patrick's College in Ballarat, where the values of justice and compassion took root. In 1940, at just 18, Laurie enlisted in the Royal Australian Air Force. He trained as a pilot and flew Halifax bombers in raids over Germany. Though he survived the war, he carried the scars of that experience.

Laurie's spirit was one of reconciliation. He later reconnected with the people of the German cities he once flew over and was honored with the Legion of Honour by the French Government – testament to a life lived with deep integrity.

In 1987 Laurie helped establish the Edmund Rice Foundation, inspired by a shared vision of a more just and compassionate word. From then on, Laurie remained a loyal and active supporter, always first to buy a table at 500 Supporters' Group luncheons.


Laurie's most powerful and lasting contribution came through a generous bequest.

Development vs non-development

As part of its commitment to breaking the cycle of poverty, we prioritise development activities over welfare activities (such as support for individuals). Development activities seek to improve the conditions of communities in sustainable ways and are based on working with communities, rather than for or on behalf of communities.

A critical element of sustainable development activity is capacity building. We achieve this through formal education, community education and development education.

In 2024, of the \$2.835m we provided directly to international projects, \$2.55m (90%) was classified as development expenditure.

Where the money came from and where it went

In 2024, the incredible generosity of our donor network contributed \$1.33m to support our partner projects.

The Edmund Rice schools network continues to be the backbone of support and contributed \$1.24m in 2024.

A significant bequest of \$8.96m was received in February 2024. This bequest will be held in corpus with investment earnings used specifically at Ruben Centre according to the donor's request.

We also received \$319k in grant funding from DFAT's Australian Government's NGO Cooperation Program.


